Public Observing Highlights

On October 23rd, several NHAS club members showed up at Mountain View Middle School in Goffstown, NH. Attendance was estimated at around 150 kids and parents.

Teacher Sue Bracy would like to extend her thanks to the enthusiastic and knowledgeable NHASers who showed the fall objects to the children. A number of people stayed the entire evening, going from scope to scope. Late in the evening, Saturn and Jupiter rose over the rooftop of the school. Images of the planets were considered watery and wavy to the experienced observers among us, but the crowd loved the views, especially that of Saturn.

Two days later on Oct. 25, our largest school-based skywatch of the year occurred at Reed's Ferry in Merrimack, NH. As expected, attendance was very high, estimated at near 350 people.

Luckily, NHAS member turnout was very high as well – at the peak, I counted 18 (yes, eighteen!) NHAS telescopes set up in the field. This, coupled with the excellent organization and crowd control measures used by the Reed's Ferry staff, never made any of us feel crowded or rushed.

Club member **David Speltz** bravely brought his 20-in. Obsession Dobsonian to the skywatch, effectively drawing most of the crowds away from our ittybitty 8-to-10-in. telescopes down in the grass. As with Mountain View, several visitors stayed late to watch Saturn and Jupiter rise over the treetops in the field.

A wonderful time was had by all. Teacher **Barb DeVore** wished to express her gratitude to NHAS, and especially those members who showed up that evening.

On Thursday, Nov. 2nd, four NHAS members made the trek up to Colby Sawyer College in New London, NH for a skywatch presented to **Lee Wilder's** Earth Science class. As a bonus, several townspeople had found out about the event and showed up as well. Total attendance was about 40-45 people. Again, **Dave Speltz's** 20-in. Obsession was a big hit, although we had to remove the scope's shroud to keep the wind from blowing it around. The highlight of this evening was watching **Larry Lopez** actually admit he was cold (I believe the exact quote was "I am having trouble generating bodily warmth") standing in the windy field wearing shorts and a T-shirt in 30 degree F weather! A skywatch scheduled for Thursday Nov. 9 was called off due to rain.

The mirror is slightly undercorrected and has a tiny "hill" in the middle, but these do not adversely affect image quality.
